DSCC Club Competition March 2025 Cityscapes




First Place 36/45 Paul Ranelli New York-1

"Monochrome really makes this image speak to the viewer. I liked the sharpness throughout and being able to see the detail in the windows. Great job"

"Nice view down the city street."

"Tack sharp. Nice use of sepia tones. Good perspective of humankind to its environment. Would have preferred an asymmetrical perspective, but that is up to the individual."



Second Place 35/45 Paul M. Zahorosky Across the Hudson

"The view is beautiful. It appears to be slightly out of focus." "Nice shot of a familiar view." "Very nice panoramic cityscape at night."



Third Place 34/45 Paul M. Zahorosky Eastward from Little Island

"I like the lines of the buildings in the background. Wondering what impression the image would make if it were photographed from a different angle. Maybe shoot from the right more?"

"Not sure what should be the subject here."

"Nice tonal values and the use of black and white. Good composition from an elevated viewpoint. If one could change one thing, it would be the undramatic sky, but perhaps that leaves more attention to the groundscape."

Mark Fitzgibbons gave an interesting presentation on outdoor portrait lighting.

The February N4C results were shown. Bob Lahti won an Honorable Mention, a 2nd place, and a 3rd place in the print category. In Digital, John W. won a Merit; Paul Z. an Honorable Mention; and Laurie M. an Honorable Mention.

The March DSCC Competition was Cityscape, and 8 members submitted 15 entries. 1st Place was Paul Ranelli; 2nd and 3rd Place was Paul Z. If you would like to read the critiques of the submittals, they can be found on the first page of our website.

The competition in April is Symmetry.

Our club judged the Travel Division last month for N4C, so our members may submit two images per person this month in Travel.

Set your focal point on the reflection

* Adapted from 5 Super Simple Tips for Capturing Water Reflections Cole's Classroom

This tip was given to me by a professional landscape photographer. It sounded a little odd at first but it can really help in certain situations.

One of the most compelling aspects of a water reflection image is the reflection itself. So it makes sense to make that the sharpest part of your image. To do that, place your focal point on the reflection itself to achieve and lock focus. That way your reflection will be sharp which adds to the drama of the image.

This only applies to calm water. If your waterbody has ripples, it won't be sharp no matter what you do. In that instance, you'll place your focal point over a spot in the foreground or background that you do want to be sharp.

Find a great spot, frame up and wait for someone to walk by. Typically a shutter speed of 1/200 or 1/250 should be fine to stop people walking fast becoming a blur (unless you want that blur?)

Remember: every cool and iconic image taken in the past was created using equipment that is less technically superior than the camera you hold in your hands. It's imagination and individuality that counts, so have the confidence to create your own images in the way you want to.

First Place 43/45 Tim Beaulier Going my way

"Striking patterns and lines with great tonal range (could mid-tone contrast been boosted just a tad??) Add the human interest plus sense of scale and you get an image you can't stop looking at. Well done to convert to grayscale, as well."

"Contemporary, vibrant, really sings."

"Fantastic! Symmetry is nailed here! And this is the perfect example of a centered image in not always bad. In fact it was absolutely necessary in this case. My overactive mind wants to know what this looked like in color and too bad all those people were not in motion so they could me made into blurs or gone all together. Winner winner chicken dinner!"




Second Place 37/45 Laurie McShane Aw, Spring

"Nicely exposed and tack-sharp. Good light, and a nice little catch light in the one eye. Could the shadows in the eye area of the left swan been raised a bit to see more detail? Good timing and capture. Might be OK to crop in tighter to them, especially off of the bottom since there is no effective reflection to see."

"Perfectly aligned" "Good shot. The only issue

"Good shot. The only issue here is the background behind the swans is fading out of focus and is just slightly distracting. I'm assuming you were using a very long lens to get this and at length depth of field does start to get iffy. So I'm not picking but what happens if the top gets cropped down a little? Great shot though"



Third Place 36/45 Paul M. Zahorosky Done With Mirrors

"Was it really a mirror, or post-process? Nice image either way with the shapes, lines, patterns, and textures -- and the contrasting blue windows frames by the bricks. Sky does not add to the look, unfortunately, and the light could have been more complementary."

"Not sure how this was accomplished but it works really well."

"GOOD job! the scale only goes to 5 but I think your technique gets an 8! Your perspective and focus are nailed. I have only achieved perspective like that using a tilt and swing camera. Job well done"

On April 15, 2025 the **Duluth Superior Camera Club** met at UWS with 22 people in attendance. Brian presided over the meeting in Joni's absence.

JK announced that the Lake Nebagamon camp for boys is currently looking for a photography counselor to teach black and white photography. There will be approximately 150–200 boys, and there is the option of residing there or commuting from your home. Also, he has about a dozen used cameras, and is looking for a location that can develop film. West Photo in Minneapolis was suggested.

Mike stated the pelicans are now at Chambers Grove, although the fisheries project has changed the experience.

Jeff asked if there are educational opportunities for photographers wishing to enhance their skills. Amber said her new store, Duluth Studio Market, is planning a 5 week beginner photo course. Brian also wants to get people together for classes and said he will plan them. A Lightroom class was suggested.

Bob King, aka Astro Bob, gave a wonderful presentation on his Northern Lights trip to Norway.

The DSCC April competition on Symmetry featured the work of 6 people with 10 entries. 1st place was Tim; 2nd place Laurie; and 3rd place Paul. Bob took 1st place in print.

The N4C March competition was presented. Bob won 1st place, an Honorable Mention, and a Merit Award in Prints. In the digital competition, John won a Merit Award in Black & White, and Amber won a Merit Award in Pictorial.

52 Photographers Share Their Best Advice

- Learn from your community. No photographer is an island. We need each other for support, education, encouragement, and most importantly, advice. In this blog post you'll get the single best piece of advice 52 photographers have to offer. The people with the best advice are usually the ones who have been through the most.
- <u>Doug Chapin</u>: Keep searching, do not settle for cookie cutter results. Try different angles, lighting, perspectives. The best shots are the ones that surprise you.
- <u>Bobby Thompson</u>: Turn around and look behind you. You might be missing a great shot.
- <u>Delinquent Rakose</u>: Have imagination. Don't always follow the trend if it doesn't fit what you feel your work is about.
- <u>Nina Covington</u>: Don't get caught up in the gear game. You can have the most expensive equipment, and it will never be a substitute for talent. Talent and ability can't be bought. Get out there and shoot. Don't wait until you have all the best gear. Work on your skills. That is your most valuable asset.
- John David: Don't stop learning.
- <u>Manuel Delaflour</u>: Remember that everything in the frame is your responsibility.
- <u>Michelle Knight</u>: Master your craft. It is not true that someone can master photography, lighting, posing & Photoshop in just a few weeks. And finding your own visual signature also takes time.
- <u>Sarah Beth Arnold</u>: Don't compare your work/ progress to other people's work. Everyone is in a different stage and path.
- <u>Michelle Connop</u>: Experiment as much as you physically can. An idea that crosses your mind is worth exploring and experimenting with. Never hold back on your own thoughts and inspiration. It might just be the best photo in your portfolio to date and often, those ideas and shoots become a catalyst for more ideas to follow; domino effect. Think of why you have those ideas in inspirations, what is it that inspires you about this idea, this can help you discover what style of work you like/want to produce more frequently and what speaks to you most as an artist! Get out of your own head, step out of your own way, and just do it...even if the photos don't work out how you wanted or you don't want to share them, I can guarantee in every shoot, even if you consider it a "failed" one, you still learnt something, even if it's learning something that you should never do again, it's so valuable! Honestly, every experiment is a success!
- <u>Nicole DeWaal:</u> in a world filled with mind blowing photography, it's easy to never feel good enough as an artist. We're often perfectionists and hard on ourselves. Don't waste time being in your own way, paralyzed with fear and self doubt. Keep creating and you'll find your confidence and style. It takes many years of practice to become highly skilled and visionary.

(3) should be a minimum ratio of 2:1 (4) the file size should be a minimum of 5mb and a maximum of 25mb (5) judging will be done in the spring. Submissions should send a *separate email* to confirm that submissions were sent so he can confirm that they have been received.
- 3. End of Year Judging– Huge THANK YOU to all the clubs that stepped up to assist with the judging of the Best of N4C in lew of no 2025 Convention. The following clubs have signed up to assist with finding judges: Black Hills, Dubuque, Image Makers, Lincoln, Minot, Omaha, and Sioux City.
